**8. COMMUNICATIONS**

**A. City Manager Comments**

Mr. Forte stated that tonight's meeting was all about grants; all good news.

**B. City Attorney Comments**

Attorney Simpson updated the Mayor and Commissioners on two (2) new Legislation Laws that impact cities but wanted to bring attention to our laws related to development. The first one was basically we cannot adopt more stringent or burdensome development regulations, whether it's zoning comprehensive plan development regulations until October of 2027 and its retroactive back to August of 2024 and this includes development moratoriums and it's in response to some jurisdictions, he thinks were coming out with very restrictive regulations because of the hurricanes and the state said we can't do that and that's why they've actually made a retroactive back to August of last year before the hurricanes ever hit. Had we had any jurisdiction that adopted more stringent regulations adopted a moratorium, after the hurricanes, the State just invalidated those issues and it also applies prospectively, if we get a future hurricane, for one year after the hurricane hits, same rule applies. It wouldn't really matter this year because they've already pivoted us to October of 2027 but say in like 2029 we get a hurricane, that's that rule will kick in again for one year. We cannot adopt and they don't define what is more burdensome or restrictive and kind of the disappointing thing is it's not limited to storm water, not limited to flooding. It's any development regulation. If we say we don't want buildings this high, can't do it. The other Legislation Law was, it's been on the books for the law that there's a time period within which we have to act when we review buildings(?), rezonings, things like that. Basically, if it's only administratively approved, it's 120 days, if it is approved through a public hearing or quasi-judicial hearing you, you have 180 days and that time period starts from the time the application is deemed complete but there really was no enforcement mechanism. What they adopted

this year was an enforcement mechanism where if we don't approve, take action within the time frame on a kind of a scale or schedule, we have to refund application fees for development activities. They kind of put an enforcement mechanism in there. No one ever really, you know it was there; we always kind of said, *"Look we got to get this done,"* but developers never really pushed that issue. Now they don't have to push, they just let it expire and they say, *"Okay give us back all our applications."* That's another thing he has emailed to staff to say and just be aware of this issue. He has never heard any issue within our city where we are reviewing things or taking too long to review things. No one has ever sent a letter complaining or anything like that. We can agree, if we run into a situation where there needs to be more thorough review before we take action then we can agree with the applicant to extend that time but the applicant has to agree, otherwise if we have questions about a project and the applicant's not willing to agree to extend it so we can try to address our concerns then it either has to come forward as an approval with conditions or recommendation for denial. We can't, if the applicant doesn't work with us and we run out of time, we can't work with the applicants to try to get them to where staff can recommend approval. We just have to keep an eye on those. The Legislature adopted those two things this year and it takes on a lot of authority because delaying a project was one of the ways the anti-growth people would kill a project. They would always say, you probably heard it, *"Oh, you're going too fast, you're not thinking about things, you need to slow down, take your time, review these things,"* State Law doesn't allow us to do that. Now they put in a financial penalty list for that. He just wanted to bring those two things to your attention just in case next year you are saying, *"Hey, I would like to maybe do this on our land development code,"* we have to come back and say we can't, we have to wait until October of 2027.

Commissioner DeLanoy stated what you're saying is we can't change any of our zoning at this point.

Attorney Simpson stated he said you can't change it but you can make it easier. Can we rezone? Yes, and usually an applicant is asking for rezoning so the likelihood that it is more restrictive, probably not but if we go into a situation where we would say, "Look, we want to increase the parking requirement, we want to have more impervious surface, we want people to have less impervious surface, we want to have more stringent stormwater regulations, we want to have lower buildings, all of those things would probably be viewed as more restrictive or burdensome on development, therefore, we can't do it until October of 2027.

Commissioner DeLanoy asked unless they're already in place?

Attorney Simpson stated well, if they're in place, we're not adopting something that's more burdensome. Say hypothetically, we allow 60% impervious service, if we went back and said, *"Look, we only want 40% impervious service,"* that would probably be viewed as more burdensome or restrictive regulation, we can't adopt it until October of 2027.

C. Mayor's Comments

Mayor Penny reminded everyone about the email from Karen Allen from the Volusia League of Cities pertaining to the Volusia League of Cities Advocacy Committee training session on Monday, July 14<sup>th</sup> from 5:00 PM - 9:30 PM. If you want to attend, be sure to let Karen know by this coming Monday, June 16<sup>th</sup> and mentioned that he plans on

attending. Thanked County Councilman Troy Kent for coming to the meeting tonight in congratulating the city in the CRA ten (10) year extension. Mayor Penny mentioned the Major League Pickleball Tournament that happened this past weekend at Pictona, great event and encouraged everyone to check it out next year. Shared his concerns that the announcer was kept saying "Daytona Beach" but nice to know that when you saw it on TV you got to see the big sign painted on the wall that says, "Welcome to Holly Hill" on center court.

D. District City Commission Comments

Commissioner Snow reminded everyone about the WiseOcean Kids Concert this Saturday, June 14<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 AM - 11:00 AM at Sica Hall and a reminder about the Daytona Beach Chamber of Commerce Ice Breaker for elected officials on July 29<sup>th</sup> from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM at Brown & Brown on Beach Street. It was exactly an event like this that got her interested in running for office and got her where she is and it's important that we meet each other and they also meet people who are thinking about doing what we do. She thinks that's the best we can do for our future. Commissioner Snow mentioned that the *Inter Agency Development Program* allowed Holly Hill's K-9 Atlas and Sergeant Stacy to support another city in their drug apprehension and if Holly Hill needed a K-9, we would get one also. It's not just a Holly Hill thing. It's working and coordinating with all the other Law Enforcement offices in our county.

Commissioner Currie stated she saw them on LIVE Patrol, which she thought was interesting and she congratulated both new Corporals from this evening.

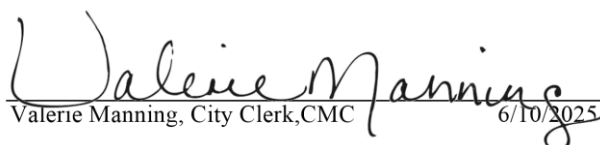
